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AUTUMN 2006 ECONOMIC OUTLOOK: LET'S NOT SQUANDER THE RECOVERY!

At a press conference on 13 November 2006, UNICE presented the Autumn edition of its Economic Outlook, a survey it conducts twice a year among the leading business federations in the 25 member states to assess economic prospects and policies across the EU. Europe is currently enjoying a period of strong and broadly based growth across sectors and countries, which UNICE estimates for the EU as a whole to translate into real GDP growth of 2.9% in 2006 and 2.3% in 2007. The current economic recovery offers a unique chance to move ahead with, and build consensus around, the reforms needed to ensure self-sustaining and balanced growth in the years ahead. EU TRADE POLICY A KEY DRIVER OF COMPETITIVENESS

On 13 November, UNICE President Ernest-Antoine Seillière participated in the Global Europe Conference organised by Trade Commissioner Peter Mandelson. After highlighting why competitiveness should become the leitmotiv for EU Trade Policy, President Seillière called on the Commission to continue to press the case for the Doha Round and to come to an agreement with the US on the difficult agricultural issue. He also clarified UNICE's position on bilateral free-trade negotiations, reiterating the need for 100% liberalisation of industrial products, full services liberalisation and the coverage of important issues such as investment and IPR. Finally, President Seillière underscored the importance of completing the single market and adopting better regulations to strengthen the international competitiveness of the EU's industrial and services base. 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RECOMMENDATIONS FOR POST-2012 INTERNATIONAL CLIMATE CHANGE STRATEGY

In view of the UNFCCC Ministerial meeting in Nairobi (6-17 November 2006), UNICE calls for the establishment of a long-term, well functioning, market-based policy framework with participation of all large emitter nations extending through to 2030. That will give investors in climate change mitigation confidence in the long-term value of their investments. Such a framework has to be economically feasible, based on respective capabilities and fair in order to avoid leakage and to safeguard the level playing field for all the actors competing on the same global markets. Furthermore, public support for research, development and demonstration to encourage solutions to climate change, including public-private partnerships and the removal of barriers to market-driven innovation are needed. NEED FOR SPEEDY JUDICIAL REVIEW OF COMPETITION DECISIONS

In response to an inquiry of the UK House of Lords into the need for a special EU Competition Court to speed up judicial review of competition decisions, UNICE has submitted its evidence. The existing system of judicial review should be improved and the best solution would be the creation of a special Competition Court. However, since this will take some time, a sensible interim solution would be to establish a specialist chamber within the Court of First Instance for competition cases.
